Thank you for your email regarding the line markings in Llandegley.

The fact that you have to slow down to turn into the side road is in some ways a safety improvement in itself. Vehicles are then not driving at higher speeds past Burton House and the church and maintaining this higher speed along the loop road. The slowing on the A44 also may also assists in the overall reduction of speeds of others travelling through Llandegley.

I am aware that the Community Council have discussed this and I have recently provided the County Councillor the background to this. I am prepared to meet with a representative of the Community Council and the County Councillor at the site to discuss. Given we are still under restrictions, it is not appropriate to hold a wider public meeting at this time.

As a resident of Llandegley I feel very strongly about the double white lines adjacent to Burton House. In my opinion, endorsed by many of the villagers, access to the village should revert back to the original arrangement for traffic coming from the south turning left at Burton house. This is a smooth gradual turn whereas the present road layout means traffic slowing to below 15 mph to be able to turn after the roundabout.which is a sharp left-hand turn.

It has been observed that large vehicles straddle the white line to turn left or right by the phone onto the A44 when leaving the village which could compromise a vehicle entering.

If you would consider coming out to the site I am concerned about, I would be very grateful as I have lived in the village for 32 years and have always been concerned about the welfare of the residents. I would endeavour to bring along members of the Community and members of the Community Council to have a fair representation of local opinion.

I would like to introduce myself; my name is Rachel Carter and I am the new 'Local Places for Nature' officer for One Voice Wales.

I live in the village of Pennard on the Gower peninsula, and I am in my first term as a community councillor, with a special interest in environmental and community projects.

Local places for nature is a capital funding programme set up by Welsh government to halt and reverse the decline of biodiversity in Wales. Under the 'Environment act 2016' all local authorities have a section 6 duty to maintain and enhance biodiversity. We want to see our member councils taking part and encourage their community to get involved in this exciting scheme.

As Community and Town councils you are well placed to develop the environmental wellbeing of the areas you serve, and One voice Wales is uniquely placed to help you deliver the local places for nature programme.

As you know Welsh government has declared a climate emergency and enacted a nature recovery plan. We want to help our councils take part in creating 'Nature on the doorstep' for your communities and leaving a legacy for future generations. Our shared experiences during the Covid pandemic had shone a spotlight on the importance of nature and green spaces in our communities and the vital role of local democratic bodies like yours.

This capital funding programme will give you an opportunity to implement projects to increase biodiversity and change your communities for the future.

My role within One Voice Wales is to help our town and community councils to facilitate these projects. I will be your specialist point of contact; from generating the initial ideas, getting community engagement, making a successful bid for capital funding and setting up and maintaining the projects.

Funding is available up to £250,000 for large projects, but projects can be any size. They range from changing mowing practices, reducing pesticides to establishing community gardens, nature reserves and lots more.

I would like to have an opportunity to make a presentation to your council and further explain the programme's objectives and the funding streams available to you. I look forward to meeting you all soon.
