



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Llandegley to Crossgates Traffic Calming on the A44

As someone who drives along the A44 twice a day almost every day, I have become increasingly aware and sensitive to potential problems that have not been resolved by our previous attempts to impose speed restrictions. It is my belief that we should consider the risks associated with the road system and encourage/lobby to get a system of speed limits that reflect the risks within our District. I have included the Railway Station as we had supported the concerns raised by the previous County Councillor, Martin Weales.



Approaching Llandegley, from the Kington side, you enter a 50 mph. zone and very quickly come to the first of two crossroads. On the left traffic emerges onto the A44 from the village and it is immediately apparent that the view of the traffic coming out from the Church side and from the farm on the other side of the road are unsafe with traffic travelling at 50 mph on the A44. There are two possible solutions:

1. Slow traffic on the A44 to 40 m.p.h.

2. Make the road through the village on the left a one-way system so that traffic enters the village at the first crossroad and leaves from at the second crossroad. (This was raised with the residents of the village a few years ago and was rejected. It is however by far the safest option.)

The next concern is at the beginning of Rhos Swydd Common. I luckily just missed having a head on collision recently when a car was coming towards me from the Common and trying to pass two cars. There is no speed limit on the stretch of road having left the 50 m.p.h. limit coming away from Llandegley and reaching the 30 m.p.h. limit entering Penybont. The main problem that arises is that some drivers, who feel frustrated by other drivers going slowly across the Common, see the end of the Common and a stretch of reasonably straight road ahead, they then accelerate to overtake the slower cars in front. This happens as the 'slower' drivers in front also accelerate down the hill to leave the Common and begin the long climb up into the Radnor Forest. This is a potentially lethal combination of events for drivers heading towards the Common and also people turning their cars, or even walking, out of Bryn Mawr, the first house on the right after leaving the Common. This is what I faced, as mentioned above, when my car braked on its own to avoid a head-on collision.

There are other scenarios here that also need to be considered:

There are far too many sheep being killed by people driving too fast across the Common,

At certain times of the year there are Black Cattle on the Common. These can sometimes, in certain light, be extremely difficult to see and it is about the potential of cattle being killed but also a collision with a cow could be extremely serious for the people in a vehicle.

It is my view that there should be a 50 m.p.h. speed limit between Llandegley and somewhere just short of Bryn Mawr followed by a 40 m.p.h. limit across the Common until it becomes 30 m.p.h. entering Penybont. Of course, if there is a 40 m.p.h. restriction across the Common on the A44 then it would be sensible to have the same restriction on the A488.

I have considered a 20 m.p.h. limit through Penybont mainly because there can often be large groups of people leaving vehicles on the road, or adjacent to the road, to enter the Severn Arms. I am however unsure about whether this would be sensible restriction, but it is worth considering.

Leaving Penybont and heading towards Crossgates sees a huge acceleration up the hill past the Nursery. There have been a number of accidents in recent years affecting cars accessing the Nursery. I believe that there should be a 50 m.p.h. speed restriction on this stretch of road to where the current restriction comes into force.

Leaving our District and entering the Crossgates District we come to an accident waiting to happen at the entrance to Penybont Station. Both emerging traffic from the station and cars waiting to turn right into the station are extremely vulnerable. In my view there should be a 40 m.p.h. limit through here and all the way to the change in restrictions entering Crossgates. Road Work signs were put up, seemingly permanently, to encourage traffic to slow down. Evidence suggests that signs, if left out in this way, quickly cease to be noticed. Another option here might be to make a footpath between the Nursery and the Railway Station. This would have the advantage of encouraging people to walk or cycle to the station, or even Crossgates.


While this would mean a series of new signs along the A44, it would, in my view, make the A44 much safer for all traffic.



I am contacting you on behalf of Penybont United Football Club. The club is proud to have recently celebrated its 100^{th} anniversary.

At present we have a Women's team playing in the Herefordshire women's league. We are privileged to have the only women's team in the area, helping us to promote the women's game locally, the Men's team currently playing in the MMP Central Wales League South which involves them travelling to play matches from Machynlleth to Tregaron and Junior teams playing in the South Powys Junior League. We also regularly organize matches for our veterans, with the monies raised at these games going to local charities. As you can see, the club plays a full role in our local community, we have a loyal band of supporters, small in numbers, but still none the less passionate with ages ranging from 8 to 80. Many of our club players and supporters live within the Penybont & District Community area.
